THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST - (Year B)

"This is my body... this is my blood."

First Reading (Exodus 24:3-8)

God makes a new covenant with his people; the covenant is ratified in blood and the people are joined to God.

Second Reading (Hebrews 9:11-15)

Jesus makes a new and everlasting covenant between God and the people. By his sacrificial death he fulfills and surpasses all previous covenants.

Gospel (Mark 14:12-16.22-26)

At the Last Supper Jesus establishes the holy sacrifice and sacred meal which is the Eucharist.

Reflection:

Eating and drinking is central to all human life.

It is thus that Jesus gave us a way to relive and celebrate what He did once for us. We are able to come together and re-enact the saving choice He made to lay down His life so that we could be re-linked to the intimate bond with Himself and His Abba-Father.

This is what we celebrate when we gather for Eucharist. We give thanks to God for all Jesus did through His life, ministry, death, and resurrection. We feast on the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation – the Body and Blood of Jesus Himself. We make ourselves present with Jesus as He celebrates the Last Supper and He comes to us as our Food and Drink.

May you remember all that God has done for you, especially in the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus, and may you lift up your thanks to God as often as possible.

What is the message of Corpus Christi?

Corpus Christi is a doctrinal feast established for three purposes: It is three feasts in one: the feast of the Eucharistic sacrifice, the feast of the Sacrament of the Eucharist and the feast of the Real Presence of Jesus in this Sacrament.

The three purposes are:

- 1) to give God collective thanks for Christ's abiding presence with us in the Eucharist and to honor Him there:
- 2) to instruct the people in the Mystery, Faith and devotion surrounding the Eucharist, and
- 3) to teach us to appreciate and make use of the great gift of the Holy Eucharist, both as a Sacrament and as a sacrifice.

The historical development: Today's celebration of the Body and Blood of the Lord originated in the Diocese of Liege in 1246 as the feast of Corpus Christi. In the reforms of Vatican II, Corpus Christi was joined with the feast of the Precious Blood (July 1) to become the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of the Lord. We celebrate today Christ's gift to us of the Eucharist, the source and summit of our life together as the Church. The Council of Trent (1545 to 1563), declared that we must honor Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist publicly so that those who observed the faith of Catholics in the Most Holy Eucharist might be attracted to the Eucharistic Lord and believe in the Divinity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, present in this great Sacrament. "The Catholic Church teaches that in the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of the God-man are really, truly, substantially, and abidingly present together with his soul and divinity by reason of the Transubstantiation of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. This takes place in the unbloody sacrifice of the Mass."






